»The Long Arc of Justice: Forging a Convention for Crimes Against Humanity«

In this timely lecture, **Professor Leila Sadat** will explore the history, development and intricacies that have defined the place of crimes against humanity in international law. Professor Sadat, who has been instrumental in furthering efforts to codify the crime in a new global treaty, will also reflect on the status and future course of this initiative. This initiative has been described by Professor Sadat as an effort to fill a gap required to complete the Nuremberg legacy.

The lecture will look to the past, to the present and to the future of this sometimes-forgotten international crime. Professor Sadat will discuss its early history in the condemnation of the transatlantic slave trade and its subsequent emergence in positive law after the Second World War. She will also explore its critical role in modern day international criminal adjudication. Finally, the lecture will examine the ongoing efforts to forge a convention for crimes against humanity within the United Nations.

Professor Leila Sadat is the Director of the Crimes
Against Humanity Initiative, a project responsible for
drafting the world's first treaty on crimes against
humanity. From 2012-2023, she served as Special Adviser
on Crimes Against Humanity to the International Criminal
Court Prosecutor. Professor Sadat is also the James Carr
Professor of International Criminal Law of the Whitney R.
Harris World Law Institute at Washington University Law
School and a Fellow at the Schell Center for Human
Rights at Yale Law School.
